

GCBHS was also invited to set up a table in the fan zone where we passed out bracelets and ribbons that celebrated the night's theme of recovery. Being at the game was important to many of our staff and clients who are actually in recovery and living proof that it is possible. "I am so proud to be a part of celebrating recovery," said Peer Outreach Specialist Erica Parks. "People need to know that being trained in how to use Narcan is not just for those who suffer from severe addiction. With Fentanyl being found in everything from edible gummies to fake ADHD medications, I don't want young people to make a mistake that could cost them their life."

In addition to being able to celebrate recovery and educate Reds (and Cardinals) fans, our staff was also thrilled when our section was shown on the jumbo-tron!











Overdose Awareness Events

Overdose Awareness Day has been commemorated on August 31st since 2001. The day helps raise awareness to the lives lost due to overdoses in the United States and around the world. This year our substance use disorder teams attended events the last weekend of the month at Fountain Square, as well as the Wal-Mart in Eastgate, and at an event sponsored by the Addiction Services Council.

JUST THE FACTS

The Mental Health and Recovery Services Board coordinates critical crisis mental health services at a low cost to taxpayers. THE LEVY IS A RENEWAL OF AN EXISTING LEVY WITH A MODEST INCREASE TO 3.37 MILLS — ONLY \$1.10/ MONTH FOR EVERY \$100,000 of appraised property value. To meet the growing demand for mental health treatment and to maintain service levels that the community has come to expect a FUNDING INCREASE IS NECESSARY, particularly as we recover from the pandemic.

Abby is still living in our women's recovery house in Clermont County but working toward getting her own place. She currently works in an office in Milford and her company paid for her co-workers to attend the Reds game in support of her catching the first pitch!

Our team helped Earl get an apartment before
Thanksgiving of last year. Prior to that staff took him
to an employment fair where he was hired by the
concessions group at GABP. Earl is still working at the
ballpark and earlier this year he received a promotion.
Because of this, he seemed like the natural choice when
the Reds honored us with the first pitch on the 31st.
